Emsworth Museum – Warblington Exhibition

CDAS will be holding an exhibition on the CDAS excavation at Warblington in the Emsworth Museum from 11th August until 3rd September. WEA Introduction to Archaeology

I know no more about the course than the description below but if you are new to archaeology and want to learn more it may be of interest.

The Havant Branch of the WEA is running a course – “An Introduction to Archaeology” at Emsworth Community Centre, Church Path, Emsworth, PO10 7DP. The lecturer is Michael Pengelly who met some of our members on the High Woods Project. Activity Start Date: 01/11/2017 at: 14:00 Activity Finish Date: 29/11/2017 (5 Weekly 2 hour sessions). “Archaeology is all around us if you know what it looks like. Over five weekly sessions, the principles and practice of archaeology will be explored with opportunity to handle artefacts, as well as practical sessions on flint and pottery recognition. Local archaeology will be considered and placed into its wider context. No previous experience of Archaeology is necessary and after the course participants will have the skill set necessary to carry out independent research.”

Since his retirement from the Civil Service, Mike Pengelly has completed Diplomas in Archaeology from the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge and gained an MRes in Archaeology from the University of Winchester. Apart from lecturing for the WEA, he also gives talks to local Archaeological societies and the U3A.
