

Chairman's Introduction

Hello everyone, welcome to the November Newsletter. We had an interesting talk from Greg Campbell in October which certainly left us with food for thought in terms of what can be achievable with regard to sieving in our fieldwork strategies. Greg's talk focused on the findings from the Fishbourne archive of shellfish remains. What it highlighted was that unless the residents of Fishbourne ate very few but mainly high quality shellfish - the archive was actually a better representation of the selective bias of the finds processing at the time of excavation than it was a representation of the Roman diet. Greg's message of "sieve, sieve, sieve!" was a heartfelt plea to improve the quality of the archive records we create (whilst acknowledging this is a wide spread issue across both the professional and voluntary sectors). Greg has written a BAJR Guide (see link below) but it hammers home this point; "Deposits now have to be wet-sieved for their shells. Sieving is more effective than handretrieval: collecting by hand recovers wildly differing numbers of shells from different deposits, biased towards larger shells, also biased towards the more common shell types". The implications of this are quite significant but we should consider carefully what is achievable and the implications on what we create as an archive. The New Park, Chichester 2024

Wed Nov 27th: Dr Mile Russell Chichester District: archaeological evidence for an early Roman client kingdom Dr Miles Russell, University of Bournemouth, where he is Principal Academic in Prehistoric and Roman Archaeology and Director of Fieldwork in the Department of Archaeology and Anthropology. Miles graduated from the Institute of Archaeology, University College London in 1988 and worked as a Field Officer for the UCL Field Archaeology Unit and then as a Project Manager for the Oxford Archaeological Unit, joining Bournemouth University in 1993. He has conducted fieldwork across the UK as well as in Germany, Sicily and Russia. He is currently director of the departmental training excavation, director of Regnum and co-director of the Durotriges Project (the latter two investigating the transition from the Iron Age to Roman period across SE and SW Britain). Miles grew up in Sussex and has also researched the pioneering work on flint mines undertaken by local amateur, John Pull. He gained his doctorate, on Neolithic monumental architecture, in 2000 and was elected a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London in 2006.

Priory Park Archaeology Project

James Kenny has obtained permission & funding from CDC to investigate further the Norman wall. The first step in the investigation will be a Ground Penetrating Radar survey that should give an indication of the extent of the structure. More on this in future newsletters

Coastal Monitoring – Medmerry

Medmerry East was visited 17th October. A new structure was recorded and a further visit is planned for when the tides are suitable.

Thorney Island Condition Assessment Programme

CDAS is to undertake vegetation clearance on three sites on 28th November.

Kingley Vale NNR - Assessment of Possible Flints Mines

The site was visited 18th October and an area identified for investigation. Next step is to prepare a proposal for Heritage England putting the project into its wider context and outlining the proposed approach. If approval is obtained then CDAS will conduct a fingertip search and possibly a small partial excavation to establish if there are any signs of flint working.

Archive & Document Storage Project

The archive has developed over many years. Some reports are only held as paper and not all reports were logged on the HER. A review is underway to clarify the position and where possible to obtain digital copies if held elsewhere.

Warblington Roman Villa Estate - Final report

CDAS worked on the site for about 10 years and this is reflected in the length of the final report currently 121 pages. David Rudling has kindly agreed to review the document prior to publication.
